Wake up to pots clanging in the kitchen. Smell the luscious vapors escaping through the back door. Peak inside the kitchen to see Chris Volk, Demos Kontos, D'Louisa Kontos Ford, Lee and Eleni Costianes, Helen Laskaris, and Duane Ferencz —all mad cooks — delivering up the feast for the multitudes. The only sense you cannot experience is taste or touch. You have to wait for dinner. Period. No exceptions.



Grab your seat for the children's talent show. Fall in love with a small child's voice — clear, unfaltering soprano — singing our national anthem. Sing along with her adoring audience. Look over your shoulder to see the Greek and American

flags hanging proudly, a reminder of where we come from and who we are.

The ordinary plates become porcelain. And the stainless becomes sterling because one thoughtful Tsintzinian family gave the silverware to the club. Such is the alchemy of the reunion.

Don your best party clothes or wear whatever you wish. It's evening and time to get your kefi on. The bouzoukia music is drifting through the open windows over the lawn to the newly lit tent and tables. Open the club door and be blasted with empowering Tsintzinian love and music. Watch Tom and Katrina Costas teach their children Alexis and Zacharias to dance. No spotlight is necessary here; their light and love illuminate the dance floor all on their own.

Make way for the young people, oh, the young people — so energetic, so vibrant, so joyously loud. Join them as they dance out the door into the driveway. Catch your breath as they weave their dance lines through the others. Look out! The young men are competing now, leaping into the air as their fathers and grandfathers did. They are our guarantee of continuity.

Stand aside for those who have lived just a little longer. Our loved ones move at a statelier, more graceful pace, each taking an opportunity to lead the dance. Give them a standing ovation. They are our

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strength, our foundation, our link to the precious past.

Feel the dance floor rocking under your feet. Our band is celebrating its 25th anniversary with us. They and their families are now honorary Tsintzinians. Their children grew up with our children; their children are our children. Feel the dance floor rocking. Demos Kontos wants to retire from cooking and enjoy time with his namesake and grandson. Take a break. It's time for the midnight buffet. Stand in the grill line. Someone is saying, "We have all this great food at the buffet. People can eat grilled hot dogs anytime they want." Listen to the crowd respond, "But these are Tsintzinian hot dogs," as if some magic turn of the grill tongs transforms them. Hot dogs and chili sauce become food fit for the gods because Peter B. Nickles continues his father's tradition. That's the Tsintzinian spirit for you.

Wait a minute. We're not finished eating? Not yet. Buy a sweet from Antonitsa's Sweet Shop, revived by the Costianes sisters in honor of Annette Mavrophillipos. Not hungry? Try the melamakarona anyway. You can diet next year.

Where are you going? We have more dancing to do. What time is it? Three o'clock in the morning!? Where has the time gone?

Okay, one last dance and you're off to bed. A glass of ouzo is in the middle of the dance floor, water for me thanks to George Sfikas, but some are still drinking ouzo. This music is slow, a zeimbekiko. Men and women, young and old, provide percussion; the older ones stand and clap hands; the younger ones squat and



slap hands on the floor. This dance is a balancing act. Swoop and twirl in rhythm to the music, circle around the glass, wave your foot over the glass, and pause as if to crush the glass underfoot. Swoop away. Do it again. Do it all again, except this time, kneel on the floor, clasp your hands behind your back, bend forward, and pick up the cup with your teeth. George H. Lambros, age 85, beloved husband of Mary (Carayanis) Lambros, died peacefully at home in Oneonta on Sunday, August 1, 2010 surrounded by his family. A lifelong resident of Oneonta, George was born in Fox Hospital on December 3, 1924 to



the late Harry G. and Mary N. (Zaharis) Lambros. An outstanding athlete, George lettered in four sports. He attended the University of Notre

Dame in South Bend Indiana for one year and played on the Freshman basketball team. He left college to enlist in the army and proudly served in the 56th Armored Infantry, 12th Armored Division. George saw combat in Belgium and Germany at the beginning of the Battle of the Bulge. He was twice wounded in action in December, 1944, and received the Purple Heart. He was honorably discharged on April 16, 1946.

Upon returning to Oneonta George joined his father in business at the Diana Restaurant, which Harry had opened on Main Street in 1921. George married Mary Carayanis of Halandri, Greece, on January 16, 1949 in St.

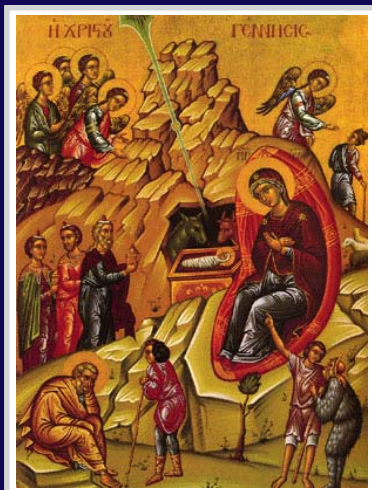

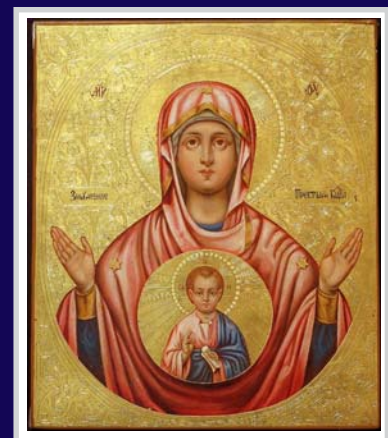
